

Task activities

Please choose one of the following activities to complete each afternoon.

<p>Can you make a rock creature? Look for a pebble or a stone and then paint it to look like a minibeast or an animal. If you have some googly eyes you could glue these on too. Perhaps you could make a whole family of rock creatures?</p>	<p>Can you draw a picture and write down one way that you can help to look after our world? Think carefully about which letter sounds you will need.</p>
<p>Go on a listening walk. You could go around your house or an outside area with an adult and practice listening carefully to all the different sounds you hear. Talk about what you heard. Did you recognise all the sounds? Were they loud or quiet? Were they long or short sounds?</p>	<p>Help at home this week by recycling your rubbish. How many plastic items did you collect? How many items were made from card? Can you write down the number of items you collected altogether?</p>
<p>Make a collection of your own noise makers. Think about lots of different things that make a sound and gather them together in a box or bag. Use one of the objects to make a sound for others to guess and identify. You could include things like crisp packets, keys, coins in a pot, a rattle or a squeaky toy.</p>	<p>Go for a nature walk with your family. Can you spot any plants, flowers and trees? See if you can find any insects, animals or birds. You could draw a picture of all the wonderful things you see. Label your picture if you can.</p>
<p>Talk about sounds you like and sounds you don't like and why. Draw some pictures of things that make sounds that you like - for example, birds singing, the sea or a doorbell.</p>	<p>Have a look around your home. How many different types of technology can you find? Which room has the most electrical devices? Talk to your grown-up and find out what they are all used for.</p>
<p>Play the game 'I hear with my little ear' take it in turns to imitate the sound of something and guess what makes that sound. You could imitate the sounds of things found around your house, like a clock or a telephone or of recognisable animals like a cat or a dog.</p>	<p>Talk to your grown-up about how electrical items can be dangerous. How can you stay safe around electricity? Make a warning sign to keep your friends and family safe.</p>
